#### INTRODUCTION

#### [Report from University Sikh society President 2010-2011]

This report will include the positive things that took place due to Sikh Society 2010-2011. All suggested improvements are written throughout the document and can be identified by being in italics. There were many things that took place during the past academic year and below shows just a few of the main highlights.

We created a new logo and produced new red hoodies. This infused us with a new path of creativity for our society.

Weekly Simran: At our first simran (meditation) the professionals KDP performed. We invited guests who had lived in Punjab to come and talk about the history of Punjab one week. Our discussions have consistent attendees from all backgrounds and religious groups. Another week, the host from Punjab Radio came to prompt discussion on Sikh Taboos. This continued for 3 hours! Our meditation became so well-known that we were asked by the SU to host meditation for Week 1 of LT "Beat the blues" which took place in the Underground.

Our Annual Bhangra Run involved dancing along Houghton Streets with traditional Punjabi drums, dressed in traditional clothing to promote awareness of the Punjabi culture.

Bhangra Workshop: For the first time ever for any University, the LSE Sikh-Punjab provided a Bhangra Workshop, headed by a professional from the US who has appeared in many UK Bhangra videos. Both workshops were incredibly successful!

Interfaith events: Firstly, there was the "Faith Fayre", where we provided information on Houghton street, and secondly the Holocaust Memorial, where Jim Walters organized for each religion to speak something about our general religious values. I felt privileged that we contributed to this event.

Inter Sikh-Society Football Tournament: We attended two tournaments this year. We came First in Tournament 1.

Raising Money for Charity WHAM: We sold Christmas cards&crackers; although we raised a small amount, £40.55, every little counts.

Collaborations 2: This was a new event where we initiated organization. There were over five universities involved to organize the RELIGIOUS CAMP EVENT. We slept over at the temple, doing evening prayers, cleaning the temple, making food, doing a homeless run, trips to visit areas relating to Sikh-history, meditation sessions, and a professional Gatka performance.

Hum Tum Ball: We collaborated with KINGS, and the LSE Hindu-Society to put on this event for 400 people.

Other important points are mentioned throughout this document. I would like to say that it has been an honour being part of Sikh Society this year, and no success that occurred this year could have taken place without the support of the committee, and the society members and friends, so I would like to personally thank all these people, that made this year one to remember and build upon. We hope that the committee next year continue to strive forward and be recognised in its progress. This year we were nominated for 'Best Improved Society', and we hope next year's committee go on to achieve it. Many thanks & God bless.

### MEMBERSHIP & OFFICERS

### SELECTION PROCESS

The Committee of 2010-2011 was selected via an Election. Those that were running for a position had to do a speech and then votes were cast. Those who voted had to be current members of the Society.

For 2011-2012, we wanted to implement an "interview" selection, where one would send in their manifestos, and then the current president, treasurer and secretary could interview the candidates to see who the best candidates were for the roles. Unfortunately, this process was not followed through as many thought an election was more democratic. Hence the selection was done once again by Election, but one could only run if they had sent in their manifestos by a certain deadline. I would advise an interview process as one can then ensure that the future committee members would be committed to their roles and would appreciate being cast into a position in the Committee.

This year for the first time, we wanted to ensure the new Committee was chosen before the holidays, to ensure they have enough time to plan for the year ahead. There was much support for this from the current students too.


